

SUMMER CAMP 2024

Camping is a significant piece of the Young Life ministry model, a chance to get young people away from their normal environment, so that they can more clearly contemplate what Jesus has done for them. Camp expands their horizons through travel and the opportunity to try activities out of the ordinary, and it provides campers the opportunities to meet new friends from all over the country!

In 2024, we once again returned to the Station at Jindabyne, with 92 campers coming from Redlands and Deception Bay in Queensland, Armidale, Blacktown and the South Coast in NSW as well as Canberra, Melbourne, Hobart and the Barossa Valley, SA. By day, campers engaged in adventure activities archery tag, water sports, hiking Mount Kosciuszko and abseiling. By night, they joined our Program Team for 'the Tonight Show' full of club games, skits, live music and the gospel message from our speaker KC Bealo. Each night finishes with cabin time, where campers and their leaders get to unpack the day, the message of Jesus and what it means for their lives.

Personally, I feel that Camp is just as transformative for our Work Crew and Summer Staff volunteers as it is for our campers. There is something significant about living life in community for a week serving something bigger than ourselves, that brings fresh perspective and purpose amidst the challenges of the broken world in which we ordinarily live. We are thankful for our army of volunteers, who give up time and resource to come serve our campers so beautifully.

Summer Camp is both the culmination of a year of walking along side young people and as well as a launching pad for new seasons of connection. Since returning home we have already heard stories of a new Club starting in Melbourne, new campaigner groups in Armidale and campers getting baptised in Blacktown. What a celebration it is to have seen 12 teens make a decision to follow Jesus at camp!

Please be praying for our local leaders who are walking alongside all our campers, as they continue to help them grow in their faith.

Young Life continues to make an impact in the Redlands through providing the Chaplaincy Program in one of our city's largest public high schools. Every week, hundreds of students are shown the love and care of Jesus through this Chaplaincy Program, which provides pastoral care, guidance, wellbeing support, referrals, mentoring, social activities, wellbeing programs and emergency relief to our school's 1,500 students, their families and school staff.

This year, our Pancake Breakfast program has experienced much growth, as more and more teens come every Wednesday to spend time with local Young Life volunteers while playing games and connecting over a freshly-cooked breakfast. I have also been extensively involved in the school's Drama Club and School of Rock programs in recent years, through which I have been able to build connections with our students and their families, as well as expand Chaplaincy's presence throughout the school community. We had the joy of sending half a dozen students to Summer Camp at the beginning of this year – most of whom came from these creative programs and our Pancake Brekkies – and two of these youth are now returning this year as Work Crew, along with a fresh batch of eager campers!

With so much growth happening within our Chaplaincy program, we are seeking God's guidance to expand Young Life Redlands to reach more teens in more schools and community spaces across our coastal city. We cannot wait to see what awesome surprises God has planned for the future of our area, and for the futures of these incredible young people we serve!

BLACKTOWN, NSW

2023-2024 has been a busy year for Young Life in Blacktown. Every week our leaders get to see anywhere from 50 to 80 young people come through our drop in space in Doonside. Over this time our amazing leaders have been able to get to know young people's names and stories as we see them come for a sausage and drink each week. Every week, I love seeing a movement of Kingdom Leaders going together modelling the love of Jesus through relational ministry! Our young friends might come for some food each week but they stay because they come to a space where they feel loved and known through great committed leaders who just show up! Our volunteer leaders and partners in ministry are so important

Week in and week out I am amazed at seeing what God is up to in the lives of not only our young friends but also in how God uses our amazing leaders who just show up in young peoples lives. I don't think we do anything spectacular but we just get to earn the right every week know them and their story and tell them about a God who loves them! We've been able to see youth get baptised, get connected to churches and get prayed for as they share their story with our leaders! We are excited for what God is doing and am praying "Lord of the Harvest, send more passionate leaders, more partners in ministry who can contribute their time, resources, and prayers to see young people meet and follow Jesus in Blacktown."

Every Wednesday throughout the school term our leaders get to a space (provided by a local church we partner with that lets us use the space for a very generous amount) that literally right across the road from the local high school.

- 1:30 Our leaders transform the space to a fun and welcoming environment that our
 young friends will enjoy. We set up board games, ping pong, basketball, bean bags
 and a BBQ all so they can experience a welcoming community of joy, friendship,
 generous hospitality all the while hoping they have an opportunity to experience the
 love of Jesus.
- 2.00 We pray for kids by name, the afternoon and that our young friends who be able to meet and follow Jesus!
- 2:20 School finishes and we are flood with Young people coming through the gates of the space! Outside the front they are greeted with a Hi5 and a warm "Hello, how are you!". There's often a line for a can and a sausage but when they head inside the centre, the space is pumping with young people playing ping pong, sitting at the table connecting with friends. Our leaders spend the afternoon connecting and catching up with the young people and even playing a game of ping pong or 2 (and obviously beating them!).
- 3.00 We get everyone together for an all in moment where someone shares a quick encouragement from the Bible and let them know how much we love them because of how much Jesus loves them. We also do a quick raffle and then invite them to explore faith more with our Discovery Bible Study time normally from 3:15. Every week our leaders rotate with who facilitates but we would get anywhere from 2-10 of our young friends coming along. There's some great conversations around what we discover about God, ourselves and what we do with what we've just discovered.
- 4.00 It's time to pack up! If young people are still around they help out pack up and they sometimes even stay to pray with us at the end! Once we're done we say good bye and do it all over again the week after!





BAROSSA VALLEY

This year in the Barossa, we have refocused on the simple goal of modelling relational ministry, with our volunteer leaders and the young people that we meet. We have seen fruit from the hard work and consistency of volunteers showing up weekly to our 2 local high schools, serving breakfasts and building relationships.

We started two new clubs – one at Lunchtime at one of our schools, inviting the teens that we have met through the breakfasts to come spend time with us during their lunch break. We were then able to invite some of these students with us to Camp in January.

In February we started our second new Club (Tuesday evenings), as a follow up with the group of teens we took to camp. It has been encouraging to be reminded that the ministry model still works (contact work to club to camp) – even as we adapt to the changing habits and mindsets of young people post COVID.

Our Wyld Life Club has also continued to welcome new faces, and we are excited to see many of these students transition into our High School Club in the coming years.

CANBERRA

The Pancake breakfast programs at Belconnen High School and Melba Copeland Secondary School remain the most consistent programs delivered by Young Life in Canberra.



For years Young Life Canberra had also been running a weekly drop-in program for the kids of Belconnen High. Late in 2023, we made the decision to switch our focus at Belconnen High to the idea of starting a 'Monday Lunch Club' on their campus. This idea was warmly welcomed and we have started building a network of meaningful relationships with a whole new cohort of students through this initiative.



Three of the students who were attending the drop-in at Belconnen High ended up joining us for Summer Camp in 2024, and ever since camp they have been meeting on a fortnightly basis with their local Young Life leader for a Bible study.



The pancake breakfast at Melba Copeland has been running for about three years, and during the 2024 winter school holidays we made plans to launch an after school drop-in program at a Church across the road from the school. This program kicked off in the 24/25 financial year and has been going really well.

UNIVERSITY MINISTRY

This year at Young Life Macquarie we are greatly encouraged by all the Lord is doing in the community, and we have been blessed to share about Young Life's work and pray for the local area with churches and other Christian organisations.

In the first semester, we launched our guys nights and girls nights as part of our ministry calendar. Over the year this has included several activities including trivia night, high tea, Vivid, and an Eras themed night. These times have created opportunities to continue to build relationship and go deeper in our conversations about Jesus. Our day hike in the Blue Mountains was a highlight as we trekked the Grand Canyon trail with about 20 young adults and leaders. INTERNATIONAL MISSION

THE BALKANS

A large focus for Young Life Europe this past year is our ongoing desire to raise up disciples in and through our ministries. All of the staff took a class called Evangelism and Discipleship together in the spring and it was a clear focus on what the priority is for our ministry. In the Balkans, where I lead, we emphasized a clear opportunity through our outreach camps for young people to decide to follow Jesus, either for the first time, or through taking a step closer in their walk of discipleship. In total in our camps in Albania, Bulgaria, Macedonia and Romania we saw 211 young people decide to take a step of faith this summer. Following camps, there were summer campaigner groups formed in Macedonia, as one example, where Wyld Life (middle school) students and Young Life (high school students) could come together after camp, where they had prayed for the first time and learn how to study the Bible together. This fall there are now 5 different Bible studies happening across the capitol city of Skopje for different ages and genders and weekly or biweekly up to 40 young people are studying the word of God.

In addition to these regular opportunities, each of our countries in the Balkans are committed to a discipleship camping opportunity throughout the year for these young people to get away and learn even more spiritual disciplines and how to grow in their relationship with Jesus. In Albania, this annual Winter discipleship weekend brought in 62 students to worship, have an interactive prayer experience, practice solitude with the Lord. It's been an opportunity for the local church partners to also bring their students also and for Young Life to be a blessing to their communities.

INTERNATIONAL MISSION



After 30 years of overseas mission work establishing Young Life in two countries, Lera and I are still amazed by the journey the Lord has led us on. This year has been especially exciting as we have welcomed new staff and volunteers, allowing our camps to move back up to four (after a decrease due to covid), hosting 150 teens and 100 leaders this past summer. We are grateful for the transformed lives and deepening faith we have witnessed among those we serve with.

Every year, there are pivotal moments, or "Kairos" moments, that capture our attention and prompt us to widen and deepen our ministry. For the most part, our focus is on non-Christian teenagers, with little consideration given to adults, church youth, or children. However, this year at camp our eyes were opened to something that had been before us all these years, but was not seen as a priority, and that was mothers and their children at camp.

In the past, accommodating families at camp was a struggle as we aimed to prioritize non-Christian attendees. We were also stretched thin by the time and resources needed to care for young children. This year, we were blessed with a larger campsite that allowed us to welcome and cater to all who desired to participate. Seeing mothers and children enjoying the camp environment was a heart warming experience.

We were also touched by the presence of new leaders like Maxim and Dominik, who had once been children attending camp with their parent leaders. Their transformation from perceived nuisances to valuable leaders serving in ministry was a profound realisation for us. How could we have been so blind to the blessings of mums and children at our past camps? Similarly, teenagers like Katya and Vasilisa, two daughters of some of our leaders, who invited classmates to camp to hear about Jesus (well done mum and dad for encouraging them to do this).

The presence of a praying grandmother at camp served as a reminder of the importance of intercessory prayer in our ministry. Her dedication to pray for all aspects of the camp, from teens to leaders and children to parents, was truly inspiring.

We are grateful for the mothers and families who support this mission movement we are a part of, they are raising children to be future leaders in Belarus and the Baltics. Their sacrifices we now not go unnoticed, and we are filled with joy and gratitude for their contributions. So, well done, mums & wives for coming to camp to pray and support the ministry, you are appreciated for bringing your families to camp because it is such a big sacrifice you make. Yes, bigger than any work crew team (who clean the rooms, toilets, do the dishes and wait on tables). Your presence is invaluable, and we eagerly anticipate the continued blessings you bring to this mission.

We equally notice and appreciate all the other behind-the-scenes contributors to this mission, such as prayers partners, committee members, church-partners, admin personnel, financial supporters and friends - together advancing God's Kingdom!
